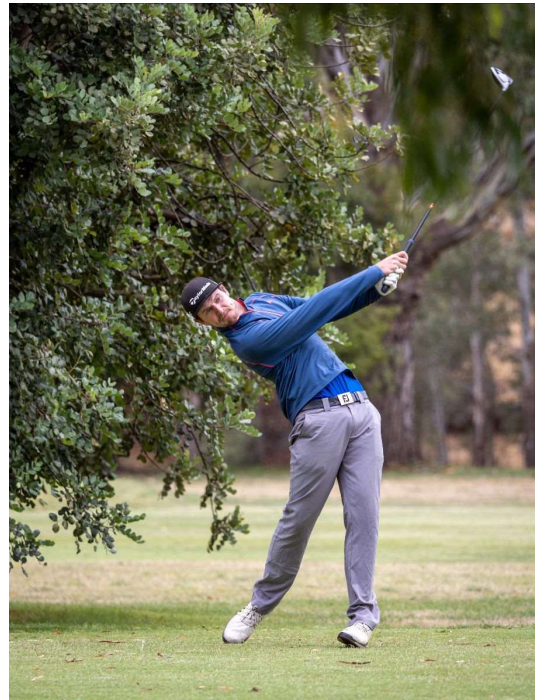

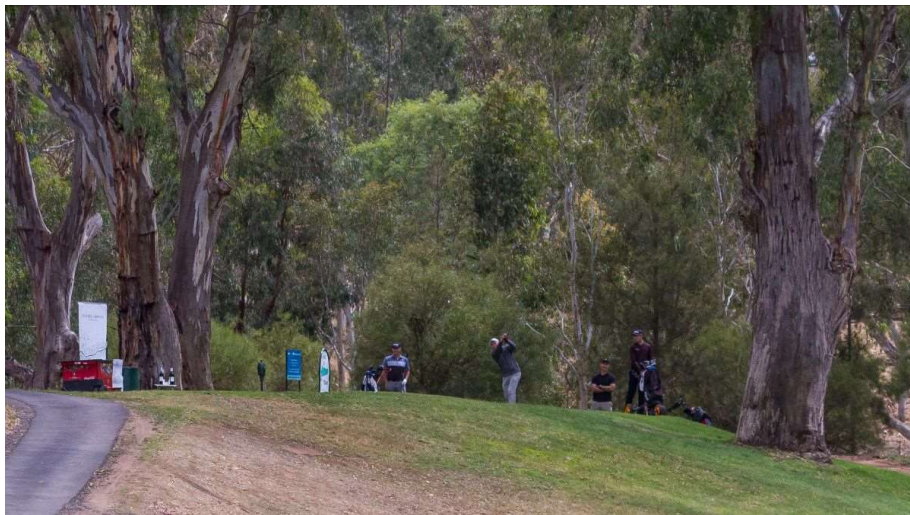

Message from the President

Hello Members

Your Club continues to go from strength to strength with membership and volunteerism growing. What a thrill to have 85 Members turn up and contribute to a fantastic Pro-Am, and each week we see many different faces volunteering in the bar, the kitchen, the Captain's Office and out on the course. Thank you all; you are our life blood.

While your Committee is pleased at our progress, we cannot afford to be complacent. The Club has some big challenges ahead as we strive to become the golf club of choice in the region. Just to list a few:

> Our golf course is generally excellent and never less than very good. This is a tribute to those who pioneered it and all who have worked on it since. But it can be even better - in fact

the truth is we need to improve it in order to keep up with clubs elsewhere that have developed excellent playing conditions. Under Superintendent Dylan Knight, we have started a grass replacement program to introduce one - maybe two in some instances - fairway species across the course. Trials of five couch types are underway on the practice fairway now to see which species thrives under typical Axedale conditions, which can include severe frosts and extended hot dry spells. This turf upgrade is likely to take several years and requires a dedicated investment.

> As our membership ages, demand for golf carts will further increase, putting pressure on storage, charging facilities and course navigation (where the asphalted paths are proving their worth). Committee is currently considering storage options and is obtaining quotes for the considerable cost of upgrading power supply to the cart shed, where we have had some issues.

> Our clubhouse is a good facility but will need to become better. The Captain's Office is cramped and inadequate, capacity will need to grow, storage - including cart storage - is inadequate, and toilets/changerooms could do with a revamp. Extensions and improvements come at great cost, but Committee is already turning its thoughts to how they might be achieved. I hasten to say we are wary - very wary - of incurring debt, having seen clubs elsewhere fold after biting off too much.

> The carpark ... well, needs work. Let's face it, dusty summers and muddy winters are less than desirable. While resurfacing the carpark ranks behind other priorities, it is nonetheless on the radar for the future.

> Technology. Our current entry/scoring system has done a fair job but we have fallen behind clubs that have installed streamlined scanning systems. Committee last meeting took an in-principle decision - and allocated funds - to upgrade our system and we are talking with suppliers. Our website, too, is okay but could be better. Our payment and merchant facilities need further upgrades.

None of these issues are negotiable - they all need attention - but it comes down to priorities and available funding. It's no secret - it's in the annual accounts - that it costs us in the order of \$400,000 each year just to run the Club. That's an awful lot of money for a volunteer organisation to raise, but we manage it. Our big ticket income items are membership, competition fees (it's why we encourage participation, not just membership), green fees, bar

revenue and contributions from our invaluable Women's and Social committees. Every time you pay a membership, enter a comp, buy a drink or buy a raffle ticket you are helping to ensure your Club can not only manage but continue to grow and develop.

... which brings me to our decision to increase comp fees by \$2 to \$12, the first increase in over five years. On current numbers, this will deliver an income boost of about \$450 per week, or \$20,000-odd per annum, or five per cent of the Club budget. That's a modest but not insignificant boost to our income, particularly when some of our fixed costs such as fertiliser and pesticides continue to grow.

Committee last year left membership fees unchanged on the basis that we had not yet mapped out a capital works program and do not believe in increasing fees for the sake of it. With that program now taking shape - and course renovation underway - I think it likely that membership fees will increase modestly when reviewed prior to the AGM (which will now be held on 12 August rather than the 26th as foreshadowed earlier).

As I say, we don't increase fees just because we can - members' money is always returned by way of course and amenity improvements. Over the coming months we will continue to inform you of planned improvements.

On the golfing front, it is pleasing to see comp numbers growing, with 120 on Saturdays, 40-odd on Wednesdays and 70-odd on Thursdays now pretty standard. It's also great to see Members' golf improving, with our newcomers whittling down their GAs and even some old stagers knocking shots off. Pennant season is almost upon us and we look as though we will be strongly represented both in the number and quality of our teams.

Please continue to enjoy your golf and your golf Club.

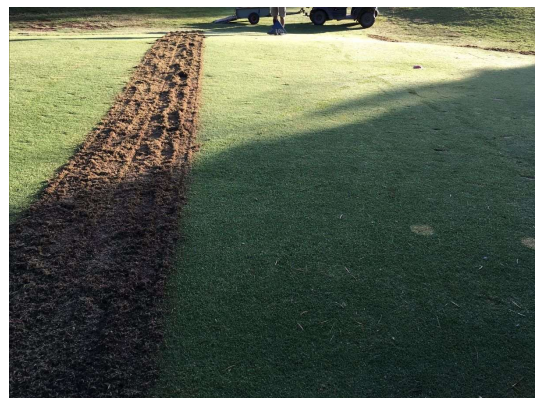
Roll on the course renos



ABOVE: Superintendent Dylan doesn't believe in letting the grass grow under his feet! This was the scene on the 1st tee last Tuesday as volunteers helped him level and resod. For a little while we will tee off the 1st from an artificial mat in front of the tee, making a short par three even shorter. No excuses now for missing the green.

BELOW: Before and after ... the practice fairway three weeks ago versus now, with the green shoots of our new fairways clearly evident. Five grasses are being trialled to see which thrives - and survives - in Axedale's variable conditions. The winner will become a turf nursery from which scarified sprigs will gradually be planted out to upgrade fairways.



The process to resow the practice fairway will be repeated as we replace our fairway grasses.

TOP LEFT: The fairway is first poisoned to kill existing grasses, then heavily watered.

TOP RIGHT: Couch sprigs are sourced. In this instance we scarified our 8th tee to gather thousands of small sprigs.

BELOW LEFT: The sprigs are then hand-sown on top of the wetted, bare fairway. This picture was taken moments after Tuesday volunteers had spread the sprigs collected from the 8th tee.

BELOW RIGHT: Dylan then used the wide tires of a course utility vehicle to roll the sprigs into the mud, creating good grass-soil contact.



ABOVE LEFT & RIGHT: Just one week in and four 15-minute periods of daily watering has already produced results. The variety on the left has clearly jumped out of the stalls, while the other has struck but less readily. Dylan and the Course Committee will monitor and evaluate all five species for factors such as ability to establish, growth rates, water consumption, resilience, etc.



UPDATE: This picture was taken on Friday 28 February, just four weeks after this first section was sprigged. It has been mown to fairway height and according to Dylan is already very close to playable.
